## Women's Voices in Audre Lorde's Selected Poems

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In this research, the writer intends to analyze poems about women's voices written in selected poems by Audre Lorde. Lorde's poems touch on so many aspects of life.

Even though Black women face discrimination, they simply become more powerful, and makes them more secure in their own uniqueness. Pain and sorrow, on the other hand, train black women to be strong. The willingness to expose black women's identities was part of a campaign to speak up and unite with all black women who are discriminated against in order to gain more power and have their rights properly enforced.
