# INTRODUCTION

## 1.1 Background of the Study

Milk fed (2021) by Melissa Broder is an interesting novel in its storytelling and character development. Through the story presented by this novel, alienation issues such as not being at peace with oneself, feeling isolated and searching for the meaning of life can be seen. In Milk Fed, the beauty standards Rachel experiences reflect societal norms that prioritize a slim and physically perfect appearance, particularly for women. Rachel feels immense pressure to conform to this ideal, reinforced by her surroundings, the media, and her family, especially her mother. A slender body is viewed as the primary measure of beauty and self-worth, leading Rachel to develop an obsession with dieting and calorie control. These beauty standards make her perceive her body as an object to be modified according to societal norms, rather than something to be appreciated or accepted. External pressures, such as her mother's criticism regarding her weight, exacerbate Rachel's feelings of inadequacy. The influence of popular culture and media further reinforces this ideal, pushing Rachel to constantly strive for physical perfection. Consequently, she experiences self-alienation, losing connection with her own body and feeling unable to live freely without guilt when she fails to meet these imposed beauty expectations.

Alienation refers to a specific scientific concept associated with particular aspects of separation. It involves the potential for individuals to be exploited for the advantage of others, to be controlled by others' desires, and to be subject to external judgment (Beaver, 2012). In another case, alienation has been referred to in relation

to the growth of shallowness in interpersonal relationships, stunted personal development, lack of meaning in life, and the "loss" or "death" of God (Elsayyad & Abuzeid, 1987). It can occur for many reasons, such as social change, psychological stress, stigma, or injustice. All of these things leave people feeling disconnected or out of control over important parts of their lives. This has devastating effects, such as lowering mental health, disrupting social relationships, and reducing satisfaction and productivity at work. Alienation is a feeling of being completely separated or out of place in one's life.

Characterization is the role and characteristics of an individual based on the way the author express himself in the story (Mays, 2016: 219). Characterization is used to explain the details of character in the story by an author in order the readers can get know them (Safrudi, 2014). The concepts of characterization and characterization are essential to understanding how alienation is experienced by the main character in the novel Milk Fed. The characterization process describes the emotional and psychological journey of the main character, where alienation is shown through the way the author expresses the character's thoughts, feelings, and interactions with her environment. By analyzing the characterization in this novel, we can better understand how feelings of alienation and disconnection from the outside world become central themes in the character's life.

Psychological alienation refers to feeling isolated from others, which often occurs in various mental disorders such as depression, anxiety and dissociative identity disorder (Chen, Chen, & Zhong, 2022). Those experiencing psychological alienation may feel disconnected from their feelings, thoughts and identity, which can lead to feelings of emptiness, loss of meaning in life and difficulty establishing real relationships with others. In the case of depression, alienation may manifest as an inability to engage in daily life, while in the case of anxiety, people may feel trapped in a negative thought loop that reinforces feelings of isolation. In more severe conditions, isolation can lead to identity fragmentation, which is a state where people feel like they have several different personalities. When a person experiences psychological alienation, they can experience an existential crisis, a condition where they wonder what the meaning of their life is and feel disconnected from their purpose. A psycho-social explanation approach postulating that social inequality causes anxiety, depression, stress, and other emotional states that produce unfavorable health outcomes, thereby creating a causal link between social position and health (Overseen & Kelly, 2022).

The purpose of this study is to explore and describe the issue of alienation as experienced by the main character in Melissa Broder's novel Milk Fed. Alienation, a theme that resonates deeply within contemporary society, is often reflected in literature as a mirror to the psychological and social struggles that individuals face. In Milk Fed, the protagonist's experience of alienation is intricately woven into the narrative, highlighting the emotional and existential disconnection that many people endure. By focusing on this character's journey, the study aims to uncover the underlying causes of her alienation, how it manifests in her life, and the broader implications it has on her mental health and sense of self.
